Pomaleu calls it a day after 20 years with IPA

After clocking in a total of 20 years with the IPA, outgoing managing director Mr Ivan Pomaleu finally called it a day with a rousing farewell dinner given in his honor at the Dynasty Restaurant in Port Moresby recently.

Mr Pomaleu worked 15 years as managing director and has left the IPA to join the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) as PNG's APEC Ambassador to coordinate policy preparation for 2018 when PNG plays host to this world event.

The function saw a packed room including invited dignitaries from both the public and private sector who listened to an accolade of speeches and well wishes led by Minister for Trade, Commerce and Industry Hon. Richard Maru.

His family including wife Waily and children Sharnia, Luna and Othniel and family relatives were present to witness the occasion.

Minister Maru in his speech commended Mr Pomaleu for the level of leadership in placing IPA at the highest level shown by the numerous milestones achieved.

Tips & Traps

Why register a Business Name?

There are several reasons why a Business Name must be registered before conducting an activity under a name.

It is an offence under the Business Name Act for any person to conduct business activity using a name other than their own.

If a business other than a person's own name is used to conduct a business activity, the same name must be registered with the Registrar as failure would amount to an offence.

Also it is important on the part of the proponent to register a business name because a name goes along with good will and it has a property in itself.

The Business Name is important to customers or clients and hence one who registers a Business Name owns that name and no one else can use that name to conduct business activities.

If the latter occurs, the registered owner of the Business Name has the right to take legal action against anyone who uses that name.

A Business Name must be renewed every year and the fee is K200, which is the same fee as registering a new business name.

IPA rolls out two important programs in the provinces

The Investment Promotion Authority Acting Managing Director Mr Clarence Hoot announced the roll out of two important IPA-led programs in various provinces last month.

These include the IPA Provincial Outreach Program which began on 24 October and the Database Survey and Spot Inspection Exercise from 31 October for East and West Sepik provinces throughout November 2016.

The IPA Provincial Outreach Program has been received in selected provinces including Manus, Milne Bay, West New Britain and West Sepik Provinces. And later, the same program will be conducted in Port Moresby, NCD on dates to be determined soon.

The Provincial Outreach two-day program in each province carried the theme "Promoting a Conducive Business Environment for everyone" and the respective teams visited provincial towns in Alotau (Milne Bay), Lorengau (Manus), Kimbe (WNB) and Vanimo (WSP).

Acting MD Mr Hoot said: "the aim of the Provincial Outreach workshop is to provide awareness on the key IPA functions and services and educate both the private and public sector on the importance of complying with business regulatory requirements and the impact it has on the growth of business in the country."

"It will also educate on how the relevant stakeholders can work in partnership with the IPA in delivering services to create a better business environment for doing business in the provinces," he said.

Mr Hoot said one of the highlights of the workshop would be the Online Registry System which came about following the review of the Companies Act and Business Names Act which he added has seen a great improvement in turn-around time for business registration and made it easier to do business registration in PNG.

Other developments the IPA has seen in recent times include the economic reforms seen in the Enactment of the Securities Commission Act 2015; Capital Market Act 2015, and the Central Depository Act 2015; deployment of the Industrial Property Automated System (IPAS) by the Intellectual Property Office of PNG; deployment of the Online Personal Properties Securities Registry (PPSR).

As well as that the IPA continues to facilitate both inward and outward trade and investment missions and effectively provides up to date information on investment opportunities in PNG and on export opportunities to international markets.

Meantime, the IPA-led Database Survey and Spot Inspection exercise for October 31 to November 19 has begun in West Sepik with IPA working in collaboration with line agencies including the provincial administrations in both provinces.

Mr Hoot said: "the primary purposes of the Database Survey & Spot Inspection are to obtain economic data and information from the business community in East and West Sepik and to ensure companies comply with the various legislations administered by IPA as well as other government regulatory agencies.

The company owners/shareholders and directors are required to meet with the survey & spot inspection teams and make available the following information:

1. Fully completed database survey questionnaire with the Company Common Seal affixed;
2. Certificate of incorporation as issued by the Registrar of Companies;
3. For foreign companies, the Certificate to Carry on Business in the Country as Issued by the IPA;
4. Any other Licenses/Permits issued by other regulatory agencies as required by the Government of PNG.

Acting MD added that this is an ongoing exercise and is intended to cover all the provinces in the country going forward.

"The main focus of this exercises is to enforce compliance," he said.

"You've done some wonderful things for this country and I'm grateful for this," the Minister said.

IPA board chairman Leon Buskens echoed the same sentiments saying Mr Pomaleu's long service with the IPA has witnessed a number of legacies which he leaves behind.

"Among some of them are the now performing Online Registry System which has vastly improved the time taken in registering businesses, the best run public sector organization for the second year running and one of the best performing organizations in as far as ensuring our Audits are up to date.

In fact speaking of audits, I'm happy to say that the IPA is one of the organizations that have clean audits up to 2015 which portrays the type of leadership and culture in terms of transparency and accountability government institutions must practice in order for us to achieve our developmental goals," Mr Buskens said.

Mr Pomaleu in his speech thanked those who had supported his leadership from both the public and private sector in seeing to the successful growth of IPA.

He said he was optimistic about IPA's future.

"I think certain adjustments we have taken at the financial front will yield enormous benefits to the IPA for the future. An opportunity before us immediately is to secure a permanent office for the Authority and certain actions taken of late will see to that. I also think that our work with the Securities Commission of PNG can take on a more prominent dimension now that the enabling legislations have been enacted. I also think that at some stage the intellectual property work must also be ramped up. At the human resources front, a more robust application of our human resource plans must be taken up, including housing for staff," he said.

Meantime, acting MD Hoot said Mr Pomaleu was an exemplary leader in his own right.

He said: "He had the foresight on where he wanted the Authority to go forward and the results speak for themselves."

APEC Finance Ministers Embrace Structural Reform

Issued by the APEC Finance Ministers' Meeting

"APEC as a group can help instil global growth amid concerns of lower trade volumes and weakening productivity," said Peru's Minister of Economy and Finance, Dr Alfredo Thorne, when he opened the APEC Finance Ministers' Meeting in Lima, Peru recently.

APEC Finance Ministers met in Lima under a week after they gathered in Washington, D.C. for the Annual Meetings of the Boards of Governors of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank Group. They continue their pursuit to develop financial inclusion policies, tools for disaster risk financing and stem the decline in productivity growth for an integrated and resilient Asia-Pacific Region.

Dr Thorne said that APEC should adopt policies to increase trade and open up economies. This includes opening services, removing trade barriers and increasing productivity.

"We are all committed to structural reforms," stated Dr Thorne who chaired the meeting. "Despite our differences over which to prioritize – whether formalization of the economy, taxes or budget reforms – we all have a common objective to strengthen productivity and competitiveness."

"In this changing environment, skills are key," he observed. "Our economies need to invest in new skills and adapt the labour force to new challenges, particularly in terms of connectivity, digitalization and technology. We need to steer our investment in that direction."

Ministers heard analyses of the current macroeconomic environment, the policy responses and the future perspectives of the APEC sub-regions and their particular economies. Measured against the global economy, it was reported that the region as a whole outpaces the rest of the world but trade is starting to slow.

"We share the concerns about where the fragile global economy is going and what we need to do to address these challenges," observed Dr Thorne.

"We need to be sure that these reforms filter through to the population-at large," he concluded.

Ministers also announced the launch of a collaboration action plan between APEC economies and the Global Infrastructure Hub, which will open opportunities to share knowledge platforms and to adopt the Hub's tools and resources.

This will contribute to the implementation of APEC's Public-Private Partnership Knowledge Portal.

This online repository is a global pipeline of quality, bankable infrastructure projects. It will also help disseminate best practices addressing contracting, financing, and funding.

Finally, Ministers gave broad support to international tax cooperation initiatives to make progress towards a more credible and effective international tax system.

The next APEC Finance Ministers' Meeting will be held in Quang Nam - Da Nang, Vietnam in October 2017.

Coffee Cupping Competition benefits farmers

Since inception in 2014, the National Coffee Cupping Competition organized by the PNG Coffee Industry Corporation has gained momentum.

The event has seen an increase in participation from farmers, cuppers, sponsors and visitors at large including potential buyers from abroad.

This year's NCCC event in August saw the Cupping session held at the Lae Interna-

tional Hotel which comprised both local and international cuppers and the Niugini Coffee Expo 2016 staged at the Sir Ignatius Kilage Indoor complex.

The IPA joined other corporate organizations with a K5,000 sponsorship towards the event and participated at the expo with a booth. According to IPA Senior Marketing Officer -Trade, Ken Pep, this year's event attracted a total of eight (8) international cuppers to make the event very competitive.

The event concluded that the coffee selected in the regional competition surpassed international score of 80 points of which the winner for this year broke last year's record scoring 85.75, above the specialty grading.

Timuza Coffee Cooperative from the Eastern Highlands Province was declared the Green Golden Cup winner of the competition and walked away with a truck from Ela Motors.

Second place winner was Tibunofi Coffee also from EHP who won K30, 000 after a score of 85.55.

The weeklong competition which ran from August 15-19 saw a total of 128 coffee which comprised 14 Robusta and 114 Arabica cups and were judged by international judges from Hong Kong, Costa Rica, Australia, Indonesia and New Zealand.

Banz Kofi prospers

Since its introduction to Papua New Guinea (PNG) some 120 years ago, coffee has become embedded in people's lives. While it may seem like a fast money-making scheme, it's actually quite taxing. It's an art that requires plenty of patience and meticulous care.

No one knows this all too well than the "King of Beans" otherwise known as Banz Kofi.

Banz Kofi has come a long way from being a humble coffee cherry/parchment company that it was in 1990.

During that time, the locally owned company was only producing high-end Arabica green beans - unroasted, raw kofi beans - sourced from remote villages in the Waghi Valley of Western Highlands and Jiwaka Provinces.

It wasn't until 2007 that owner Patrick Kiloran embarked on roasting the green beans. Banz Kofi's journey has resulted in a very good customer base from various parts of the world.

From the top of Mt. Kilimanjaro to the plethora of Renaissance architecture in Estonia, Banz Kofi has made its mark known as the "King of Beans".

Although the company has its main customers in PNG, its focus is international as that's where growth can be found.

The Pacific Islands Trade and Invest has made it possible for Banz Kofi to expand further by helping it to attend tradeshows in Auckland, Melbourne and Paris during 2016 where it can promote its exports.

The IPA has also been involved in promoting Banz coffee through various expos including a trade mission to New Zealand as well as the PNG International Business Summit held in Brisbane, Australia.

Lumeuas Cove Retreat has potential

The Lumeuas Cove Retreat is a family-operated Eco Tourism Centre which seeks an investment partner to develop it further.

A company has an obligation to report its activities annually. It does this by submitting an Annual Return to the Office of the Registrar of Companies.

It must also lodge with this Office, information concerning any changes in directors, secretaries and number of shares on issue and other matters.

In addition, there are other legislative requirements by other agencies and professional independent advice must be sought.
